The charities helped by the AMA Outreach Volunteers this year are The Childrens Tumor Foundation and ARC:

- The Childrens Tumor Foundation is dedicated to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families affected by Neurofibromatosis, a disease which causes tumors to grow on nerves throughout the body and affects one in 3,000 children. This disease is more prevalent then Cystic Fibrosis, Huntington's Disease and Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy combined.

- The ARC Charity promotes the welfare, protection, and advancement of individuals with developmental disabilities. ARC began in 1969 with two parents meeting in Studio City park. Since then ARC has provided help to individuals with developmental disabilities, serving over 100 individuals and their families in the LA Area.

Jeannie Smith helped get the crowds seated and our very own Scotto, of strolling magic fame, helped control the line of people at the door entering the stage acting as an impromptu bouncer. I'm sure Scotto has a new appreciation for the door bouncer job Jean Boyle normally took on for herself at the past 4th of July charity events.
